We have a dynamic and diverse group of subject matter experts finalizing the practice analysis that will result in this portfolio-based assessment. The AD-CIP exemplifies the knowledge, skills, and abilities expected of individuals who demonstrate professional expertise working in IPC, and our work is being guided by the APIC Competency Model. We look forward to sharing updates with you at the APIC Annual Conference in June.

In 2024, CBIC launched its ambassador program. Shazia Irum, RN, MSC, MBA, CIC, CPHQ, was selected as our first ambassador. Shazia has been CIC-certified since 2019 and has over eight years of experience in IPC. Her current title is infection control specialist at King Salman Center for Kidney Diseases in Riyadh, Saudia Arabia.
